Dear Patron,

You may have noticed recent suggestions that we read to children starting at birth because reading helps young brains to develop. But, it is not just young children whose brains benefit from reading. According to Brandon Spector ("Why It Pays to Increase Your Word Power", Reader's Digest, Sep. 2017, pp. 66-72), book readers have more connections in their brains than non-book readers which provide "a greater defense against the worst effects of cognitive decay".

Spector says that research shows that people who read books for about 1/2 an hour per day also live an average of two years longer than their non-book-reading counterparts. Interestingly, reading newspapers or magazines did not show the same benefits as reading books. Researchers believe that this is because chapter books cause people to make connections between chapters which translates into new connections between regions of the brain. These extra connections have many positive consequences, including making the brain more able to recover from a stroke.

When the doctor tells us to get more exercise or stop eating so

much junk food, we may have to force ourselves to comply. But this time, the good advice for our health is also fun! So, come on into the library, and pick up your prescription for good brain health: a book!
